What is Contesting?

Contesting, also known as Radio Sport is a fun way to enjoy the Amateur Radio Hobby by competing against others (and yourself) to accomplish a shared objective (IE: make the most QSOs using common parameters).

The goal of Amateur Radio contesting is to contact as many stations as possible during the contest period.

Every contest has Contest Rules:

- Only certain bands may be used
- The contest only takes place between certain times and on certain dates. Some contests also require “off times” when you are required to take a break from operating.
- An exchange of information is necessary during each contact. You may be required to send and receive a serial number, location, name or even a person’s age.
- Only certain operating configurations can be used. You may have to choose a “category” of operation such as a single operator using low power.

Some competitions, such as the ARRL Sweepstakes, draw large numbers of hams onto the airwaves. Other contests are smaller with only limited participation.

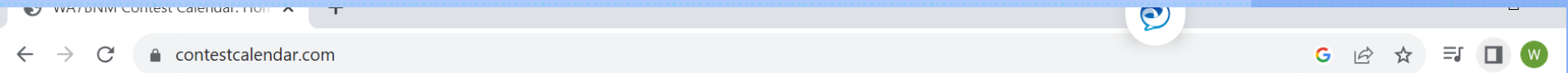
Contests take place on both the HF and VHF/UHF/microwave bands. On HF, contests take place on 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10-meters. Contest sponsors have agreed to keep the 60, 30, 17 and 12-meter bands off limits from competitive events. There are also contests on the VHF, UHF and microwave bands.

Welcome to the **WA7BNM Contest Calendar**. This site provides detailed information about amateur radio contests throughout the world, including their scheduled dates/times, rules summaries, log submission information and links to the official rules as published by the contest sponsors.

8-Day Calendar

Lists details for each contest during an 8-day period, starting with yesterday.

5-Week Calendar

Lists the names and dates for each contest for the current week (Monday thru Sunday) plus an additional four weeks. Weekly contests are listed in a separate section.

12-Month Calendar

Lists the names and dates for each contest for a 12-month period starting with the month immediately previous to the current month. Due to the difficulty obtaining accurate contest information, as much as 12 months in advance, not all contests may appear for later months.

Perpetual Calendar

Lists the names and dates for each contest during a selectable future calendar year that can be accurately predicted in advance.

State QSO Parties

Lists the names and dates for each contest focused on a single state or group of states in the current calendar year.

CW Calendar

Lists those contests from the 12-month calendar that specify use of the CW mode, entirely or as a separate class of operation.

QRP Calendar

Lists those contests from the 12-month calendar that specify a maximum power level of less than 10 watts (typically 5 watts) entirely or as a separate class of operation.

Why enter a contest?

Types of Contesters – Who Does Ham Radio Contesting and Why

- The Casual Contester

A desire to just have some fun, improve operating skills, and work new countries, states, counties, etc. from the smorgasbord of participating stations



- The Feisty Contester

A desire to compete

- The Committed Contester

Able to leap tall buildings with a single bound

Able to master the art of sleep deprivation



Benefits of Contesting

- It's just FUN
 - Gets the competitive juices flowing
- Improves operating skills
 - Excellent preparation for emergency operations
- An excellent use of our allocated spectrum

Remember: "Use it or lose it."



Do I Have to Have a “Contest Station”?

- Plenty of Big Gun contest stations
 - Multiple radios
 - Multiple towers
 - Serious station automation
- Also plenty of “normal” stations

*You don't have to be a Big Gun
to have Big Fun contesting!*



How to Win a Contest

- Work a lot of stations
- Work as many “multipliers” as possible
- Work smart
 - Make good band change decisions
 - Use efficient operating techniques
 - Don’t waste time or words (similar to emergency operations)
 - Know when to “Run” and when to “Search & Pounce”
 - Know when to take a break
 - Know when to change bands



Many different types – beginner to expert

- SSB, CW, RTTY
- DX
 - ARRL, CQWW, IARU, WPX, foreign hosted, etc.*
- National
 - Field Day, Sweepstakes, NAQP, VHF/UHF, State QSO Parties, etc.*
- Specialty
 - Sprints, FOC Marathon, SOC, SKN, etc.*

- These are not technically contests, but they share many traits with contests and use similar operating skills. They are a good way to start and fun.



Multiple categories

... designed to let you compete on a level playing field

- Single operator
 - Assisted/unassisted
- Power
 - QRP, low, high
- Single band and/or mode
(some contests)
- Multi-op, single transmitter
- Multi-op, multi-transmitter



When are contests run?

- Usually on weekends
- Starting/ending times vary by contest
 - Durations as short as 1 hour
 - As long as 48 hours
 - Max operating hours also vary

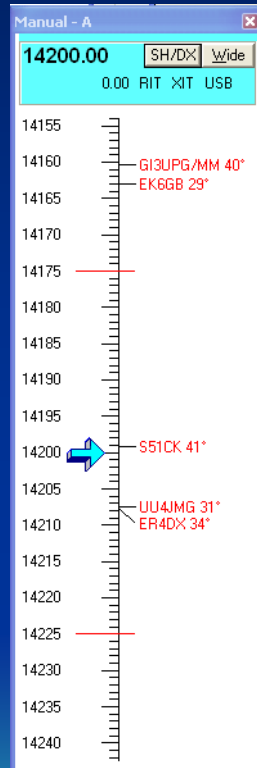


What's Req'd to Get Started?

- A radio and antennas
- A logging system
 - Pencil & paper
 - Tried and true, but hard to keep track of dupes
 - Computer based logging software
 - Many options from freeware to networked
 - DOS-based: TR Log (\$60-75)
www.trlog.com
 - Windows-based
 - N1MM (free) www.n1mm.com
 - Writelog (~\$75) www.writelog.com
 - N3FJP (\$39-49) www.n3fjp.com
 - Can even trigger pre-recorded voice, CW, or RTTY exchanges



Advanced Operation: Interfacing Your Radio



- Serial, USB and Parallel Options
- Why do it?
 - Logging automation: less work for you = higher QSO rates
 - Date/time
 - Freq/mode
 - Contest exchange
 - Integrated “point-and-shoot” DX cluster operation
 - Trigger transmitted exchanges



How do I report my results?

- Officially
 - Snail mail
 - Email
 - Cabrillo file generated by most computerized logging programs (may be req'd to be declared a winner)
- Unofficially
 - 3830
 - On the air
 - <http://www.hornucopia.com/3830score/>
 - At club meetings, on nets, at Hamfests



What Can I Win?

- Trophies, plaques, certificates
- Goodies
 - Example: [WA State QSO Party “Salmon Run”](#) category winners receive smoked salmon
 - NC and SC QP used to give BBQ to the winner
- QSOs toward non-contest awards
- *The awe and respect of your fellow competitors (aka “bragging rights”)*



Next Big Contest: NAQP SSB

- *North American QSO Party SSB*
- North American QSO Party
- The North American QSO Parties are favorites of beginners and seasoned operators alike. The NAQPs are low-power only (no amplifiers allowed) which makes for a lot more breathing room on the bands. Small stations can generate very effective “runs” in the NAQP contests. Multipliers count once per-band, which makes for an exciting format, as multipliers can be “moved” from band to band. The NAQPs allow stations from all parts of North America to be in the running for the top spots. The 12 hour format allows participants to do some great contesting, yet still have time for other activities during the weekend. Participants can enter in the single op or multi-op categories
- Exchange is simply your first name and your state : Bob NC

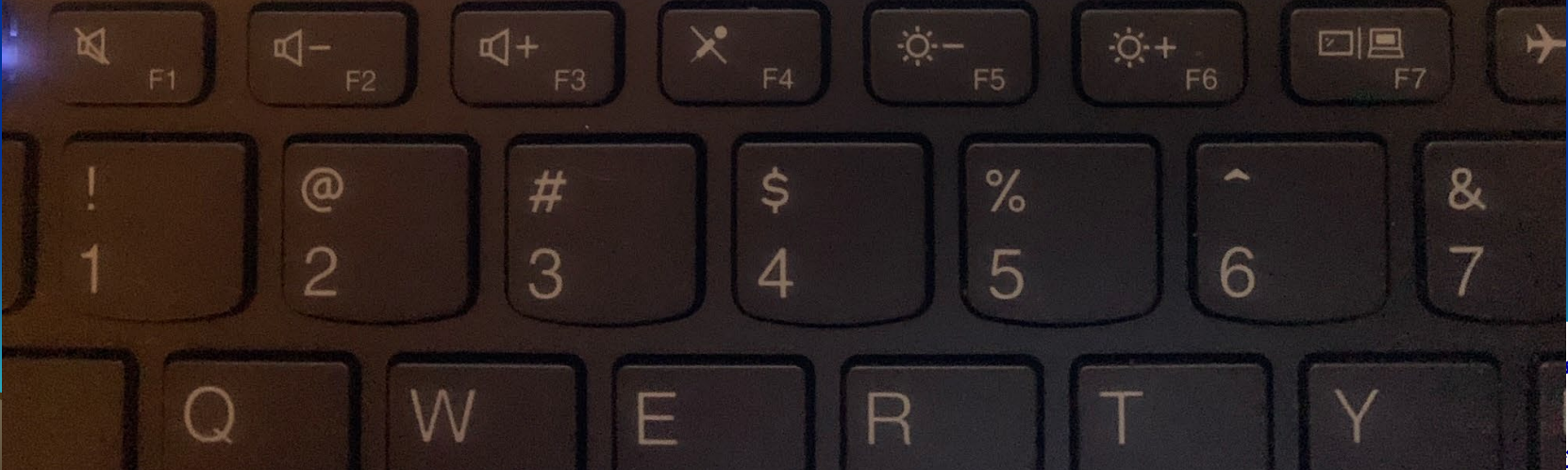
